

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TRIBUTE BY HER EXCELLENCY CHRISTINE KANGALOO TO THE LATE FORMER PRIME MINISTER BASDEO PANDAY

hen Basdeo Panday passed from this life on the 1st of January 2024, Trinidad and Tobago lost more than just its 5th Prime Minister. We lost one of the largest and most colourful figures in the modern history of the Caribbean. We lost a man who blazed a trail like few others before him ever had, and like few others ever will again.

We lost a feisty fighter, who faced every battle head-on: winning some and losing some along the way; at times hurting his opponents; at times, hurting himself. We lost a man who yielded no ground during his 90 years. We lost a man who lived his life to the fullest and who, in the course of doing so, set the national landscape on fire

From Princes Town to Port of Spain; from Couva North to the Caribbean; from the Bahamas in the North to Guyana in the South - Basdeo Panday was a man who fascinated a region with his charm and enthralled a nation with his wit. Mind you - that wit could turn from delightfully charming to devastatingly caustic at the drop of a hat; something that I observed first-hand when I sat across the floor from him in Parliament during the period 2007 to 2010. During that period - in what turned out to be the sunset years of his political career - he would, on the occasions when he was not waxing lyrical in the course of a contribution, often sit with his head buried in a book, never looking up, almost daring those on the opposite side to interfere with his peace. Woe betide the unsuspecting soul who dared to do so. We all learned early on not to trouble the Lion when he was at rest. And, even though the Lion has now entered into another state of rest, many of us who learned that lesson were so traumatised that, to today, we remain a little apprehensive about saying anything even remotely critical of him, lest we awaken his ire once more!

Basdeo Panday certainly had enough people who were critical of him during

his lifetime. He had his fair share of detractors. That is hardly surprising. As a meteor blazes its trail across the sky, it burns everything that is in its path, because that is the nature of a meteor's existence. And, since Basdeo Panday was one of the brightest meteors in the country's galaxy, it would not be surprising if, in his wake, he burnt bridges at times. But Basdeo Panday also had at his side, his friends with whom he built indestructible bridges and long and lasting relationships; and his family, whom he loved more than life itself. Doubtless, it was they who gave him strength when the days grew dark, as sometimes they did, even in his colourfully brilliant life. I remember when Basdeo Panday first impressed himself unto my consciousness. And I remember what impressed me then, the most about him.

The year was 1984. My brother Wendell has just been called to the Bar, and my father had called together a few of his friends to a celebration at our home in St. Joseph Village, to mark the occasion. Basdeo Panday was among those friends. What most impressed me about him that evening, was not his legendary charm or his delightful wit. What struck me the most about him, was that he was a man

completely and utterly in love with life. He and his beloved Oma danced the evening away with complete abandon, moving to the music in a way that even then, in my youth, it was difficult for me and my friends to match. He was to show that same energy, and some of those very dance moves, almost 40 years later when he mounted the stage at Brian Lara's All-Inclusive Carnival Party recently, to the utter delight of an adoring audience. His energy was as infectious then as it had been at Wendell's party, and it dawned on me that evening that here was someone who understood and who practised the art of the moment - of giving oneself completely to the present moment, unburdened by a past – which can never be changed, and unafraid of a future which can never be held.

What also struck me about him that evening at Wendell's party was the love that he had for his wife, Oma - a love that endured until his dying day. In later years, I would look on, in quiet admiration, at how that love was shared among his family, and especially with his daughters - Niala, Mickela, Nicola and Vastala. Trinidad and Tobago has been lucky enough to witness regular demonstrations of his relationship with Mickela, with whom in later years he would often attend official events. Every time I saw a picture of him and Mickela, I would think to myself what an example he was to fathers everywhere. How I wish that our country's fathers would model and emulate their closeness. What the nation saw between him and Mickela in public, is what every member of his family felt, away from the public glare. We need to remember that Basdeo Panday was not only a public figure, but that he had an immensely meaningful private life. His family has lost their North Star.

COMMONWEALTH COMMEMORATES 75 YEARS

ommonwealth Day 2024 was celebrated on Monday 11 March 2024, with a multicultural and multi-faith service at Westminster Abbey, London. The service commemorated 75 years since the founding of the modern Commonwealth, under the

theme 'One Resilient Common Future'.

Representing Trinidad and Tobago were High Commissioner Vishnu Dhanpaul and Flagbearer Ms. Jovanna Maharaj, a national high achiever. Additionally, Ms. Maya Kirti Nanan, another Trinidad and Tobago national, had the honour of being the flag Commonwealth bearer at the celebration. Ms Nanan holds the prestigious title of Commonwealth Young Person of the Year 2023/4.

During the Commonwealth Day Service, King Charles, in his role as Head of the Commonwealth, emphasized the importance of unity and collaboration. He stated, "Together and individually, we are strengthened by sharing perspectives and experiences, and by offering and borrowing the myriad ways we have each tackled the challenges of our time. This is

true both at the level of nations and, indeed, at the local level". The service was attended by The Queen, The Prince of Wales, and other members of the Royal Family.

n 21 March 2024 Ambassador Vishnu Dhanpaul presented his Letters of Credence to His Majesty Carl XVI Gustaf King of

Sweden, accrediting him as Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago to Sweden. The presentation took place during a private audience at the Royal Palace in Gamla Stan, Stockholm, Sweden.

During the meeting High Commissioner Dhanpaul engaged in brief conversation with the King of Sweden regarding Trinidad and Tobago's relationship with Sweden. At the end of the Credentials Ceremony, High Commission Dhanpaul signed the Visitors' Book.

Trinidad and Tobago and Sweden established diplomatic relations in July 1966. Since that time, Sweden has been involved in a number of development

projects, including the Point Lisas Housing and Urban Development Programme, the Ferry Service between Port of Spain and Scarborough and Administrative Improvement in the Public Service.

The High Commissioner is also the Ambassador for the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago to the Federal Republic of Germany, the Republic of Finland and the Kingdoms of Sweden, Norway and Denmark.

he Government of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago invited stakeholders' participation in its Shallow Water Competitive Bidding Round 2023. This bid round contains thirteen (13) offshore blocks located along the western, eastern, southern and northern coasts of Trinidad and Tobago respectively.

The Shallow Water Competitive Bid Round was opened on 3 October 2023 with the deadline for submission of bids being 12 noon on 27 May 2024. Successful bids will be announced four (4) months following the close of bidding.

The Ministry of Energy and Energy Industries (MEEI) organised a Roadshow at the High Commission for Trinidad and Tobago in the UK on 25 March 2024 and



TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO WRITER WINS CARIBBEAN PRIZE IN 2024 COMMONWEALTH SHORT STORY COMPETITION

Subran ortia named the Caribbean regional winner of the 2024 Commonwealth Short Story Prize for her short story The Devil's Son.

Subran was awarded £2,500 for her winning entry, which was set in 1950s Chaguanas, Trinidad and Tobago. The story followed a retired oil worker whose buried secret was awakened by a haunting song, coinciding with the arrival of electricity in his village.

A writer and ink artist, Subran drew inspiration from her parents' colonial-era tales and her personal experiences. She previously won the 2019 Cecile de Jongh Literary Prize and the 2016 Small Axe Literary Short Story Competition and was a finalist in the 2022 BCLF Short Fiction Story Contest.

is awarded Story Prize annually for the best piece of unpublished fiction from the Commonwealth. The 2024

prize received 7,359 entries. The regional winners advanced to the final judging, and the overall winner, announced The Commonwealth Short on 26 June 2024, was Ms Sanjana Thakur from Mumbai, who received £5,000.

Tobago Writers Shortlisted were Stefan Bindley-Taylor for his short story Wrinkle Release and Celeste Mohammed for her short story Terre Brulée.

Celeste Mohammed is a lawyerturned-writer with an MFA in and Creative Writing from Lesley

University. Her award-winning short stories reflect her Indo-Trinidadian heritage and the challenges of growing up in a post-plantation culture marked by intimate partner violence. unpublished explores this complex history.

Stefan Bindley-Taylor is a Trinibagonian-American musician, writer, and educator. Based in Brooklyn, his writing blends absurdist and surrealist elements with a West Indian perspective, inspired by authors like V.S. Naipaul and Frantz Fanon. He also performs in the hardcore project FISHLORD and the alternative hip-hop project Nafets.

Both writers were among the 23 shortlisted authors selected by the international judging panel.

Kevin Jared Hosein wins 2024 Walter Scott Prize for 'many-layered tale' of 1940s colonial Trinidad

evin Jared Hosein, a Trinibagonian author, was awarded the prestigious 2024 Walter Scott Prize for Historical Fiction for his novel Hungry Ghosts. Set in 1940s Trinidad, the novel was praised by judges as "richly imaginative, urgent, and compelling." Hosein was presented with the £25,000 prize by Mathew Maxwell Scott.

The Walter Scott Prize, established in 2009, is one of the UK's most esteemed literary awards, recognising excellence in historical fiction. The prize celebrates works that evoke the spirit of the past and enhance the appreciation of historical narratives in literature. Open to novels published in 2023 in the UK, Ireland, or the Commonwealth, the prize is reserved for books set at least 60 years ago, highlighting the lasting impact of historical storytelling.

MINISTRY OF ENERGY AND ENERGY INDUSTRIES SECURES IOPC FUNDING FOR TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO

he Ministry of Energy and Energy Industries reported that the Honourable Stuart R. Young M.P., Minister of Energy and Energy Industries and Minister in the Office of the Prime Minister I, led a high-level delegation to the London office of the International Oil Pollution Compensation (IOPC) Fund where Minister Young successfully advocated for Trinidad and Tobago's access to the 1992 IOPC Fund, resulting in the 1992 Fund Executive Committee deciding:

(a) that the 1992 Civil Liability and Fund Conventions would apply to this incident (the recent oil pollution incident off the Coast of Cove, Tobago); and

(b) to authorize the Director to make payment of compensation in respect of claims arising from this incident.

This decision provides for Trinidad and Tobago to be reimbursed its costs incurred as a result of the oil spill incident in February 2024.

T&T SCRIPT UNVEILING THE UNTOLD STORY OF CAZABON SHINES IN UK FILM FESTIVAL COMPETITION

azabon, a script penned by filmmaker Marilyn Birchfield, been chosen for the second phase of the UK Film Festival (London) Script Competition. The script delves into the intriguing life of nineteenthcentury Trinidad and Tobago landscape artist Michel-Jean Cazabon, focusing on his complex relationship with the British Governor, Lord Harris, and his romantic entanglements with French Creole woman Madeline Saturnin.

Born in 1813 to a French Creole father who migrated to Trinidad and Tobago from Martinique, Cazabon's artistic legacy lies in his distinctive portrayal of Trinidad's tropical landscape using traditional European techniques learned during his art studies in France. Despite not inventing a new painting style, Cazabon left an indelible mark on the local art scene, becoming one of the most renowned artists of the nineteenth century in Trinidad.

Birchfield, herself from Trinidad and Tobago with a mixed cultural background, found Cazabon's story captivating due its to of exploration culture, friendship, and the love of art.

Drawing on research by the late local historian Geoffrey MacLean, Birchfield crafted her script, aiming to shed light on the artist's life and legacy.

MacLean's research, however,

faced challenges due to the absence of self-portraits or photographs of Cazabon, leading to speculation that they were destroyed by his family members to protect his reputation. Despite this void, MacLean became a leading authority on Cazabon's life and work.

Birchfield's exposure to diverse cultures through her upbringing and professional experiences led her to establish her own production company, emphasizing the importance of preserving Caribbean cultural heritage through film and media.

Excited by the recognition her script has received, Birchfield hopes it will be developed into a feature film, contributing to the growing interest in Cazabon's work, particularly in Europe. For future projects, she plans to explore Trinidad's rich folklore and heritage, including stories of La Diablesse and the soucouvant.



BRINGING SAM SELVON'S CLASSIC TO LIFE: THE LONELY LONDONERS HITS THE STAGE

ermyn Street Theatre premiered its adaptation of Sam Selvon's iconic novel about the Windrush generation, "The Lonely Londoners". Samuel Selvon, a Trinidad and Tobago-born writer who moved to London, England, in the 1950s, penned this groundbreaking novel. His innovative use of creolised English, or "nation language", for narrative as well as dialogue, continues to resonate with audiences. Adapted by Roy Williams and directed by Ebenezer Bamgboye, the production ran from 29 February to 6 April 2024.

Set in London, 1956, the story followed Henry 'Sir Galahad' Oliver, a recent immigrant from Trinidad eager to begin anew. However, upon his

arrival at Moses Aloetta's doorstep, he discovered his host and friends disillusioned with city life. Would London's challenges dim Galahad's aspirations, or would these Lonely Londoners forge a home in a city that viewed them with suspicion?

In the first stage adaptation of Selvon's celebrated 1956 novel, Williams swept audiences back in time to shine a new light on London, friendship, and what they called home. The cast comprised of Tobi Bakare as Lewis, Gamba Cole as Moses, Shannon Hayes as Agnes, Gilbert Kyem Jnr as Big City, Carol Moses as Tanty, Aimee Powell as Christina, and Romario Simpson as Galahad.

Stella Powell-Jones, Artistic Director of Jermyn Street Theatre, expressed her excitement for the production, highlighting the significance of premiering the play at a venue so close to the setting of the novel. She anticipated the audience's response to this captivating, humorous, and poignant portrayal of characters that had resonated with readers for decades.

'TRINIDAD REMAINS' SHINES AT LA AND LONDON FILM FESTIVALS

√he UK-TT Film Trinidad Remains made waves on the international festival circuit. The film was selected as one of 500 films from 5,000 submissions for the London Short Film Festival in January 2024. One month later, Trinidad Remains formed part of the line-up of over 140 films at the 32nd Pan African Film and Arts Festival in Los Angeles, California, USA.

The brainchild of UK-based, Trinidad and Tobago filmmaker Karen Martinez, Trinidad Remains premiered at the trinidad + tobago film festival (ttff) in September 2023, where it won the Best Narrative Short Film Award. This film is the product of a pioneering UK-TT collaboration. Karen Martinez joined forces with UK award-winning producer Natasha Dack-Ojumu of Tigerlily Productions and Trinidad and Tobago producer Lisa Wickham of Imagine Media International to bring to life the





story of a British woman visiting her ancestral home for the first time.

Emotional and evocative, the story sells itself. Dack-Ojumu, alongside Martinez, secured funding for the short film from the British Film Institute (BFI) and C15 Studios, while Wickham secured funding from FilmTT and TASC Enterprises Limited. Wickham also formed strategic partnerships with instrumental organisations such as the Chaguaramas Development Authority (CDA), the Airports Authority of Trinidad and Tobago (AATT), the Trinidad and Tobago Police Service (TTPS), the Ministry of Tourism,

Culture and the Arts and the Ministry of Trade and Industry, to successfully execute the film.

The script was inspired by Martinez' experience as a Trinidad and Tobago national living in London for over 30 years and is based on a storyline from Scattered, the feature script that Martinez is developing with Dack Ojumu and Tigerlily Productions, also funded by

Shooting for the film took place in January 2023, with a local crew of 32 persons supporting the UK-Spain team. Among the local crew were emerging filmmakers who benefited from hands-on training on the set of Trinidad Remains, as part of FilmTT's series initiative "Meet the Practitioner-Lessons with Lisa" under the guidance of Wickham.

In front of the camera, acclaimed actors Syntyche Bishop and Kevon Brooks were cast alongside British actress Leonie Elliot, known for her starring role in the BBC's Call the Midwife. This, as well as the lush

terrain of the Northern Range, formed the perfect backdrop to this compelling story, underscoring the inextricable link between the land and its people.

Captains of industry at a private investor screening, praised the cinematography and original storytelling, the stunning visuals of the natural landscapes, and the authenticity with which the actors' lines were delivered. With rave reviews received from audiences, producers Dack-Ojumu

and Wickham look forward to full support for the production of the TT-UK feature film, Scattered, scheduled to be shot in Trinidad. "People want to see more," Martinez observed; "they want to see how the characters develop and how the journey ends."

The event featured a showcase of Trinidad and Tobago's visual arts, music, literature, and culinary heritage. The High Commission in London provided space for the exhibition, reflecting its commitment to supporting cultural initiatives.

The exhibition featured paintings capturing life in Trinidad and Tobago, as well as displays of traditional delicacies such as kuchela, red mango, bene balls, and sugar cake. The event attracted 200 attendees of both Trinidad and Tobago heritage and other backgrounds. The programme included performances by UK-based calypsonian Alexander D Great, steel pan music by Dexter Marchan, and a selection of calypso recordings, including tracks from former monarch Terri Lyons.

Chef Shane "Chef Chin" Austin provided insight into the history of local dishes such as doubles, pelau, coo coo, callaloo, and saltfish buljol. Book readings featured works by authors Sanja Dharamdass, Linda Green, and Keon Francis, while exhibitors such as Mink Wink and PanMasTraditions presented products and traditional Carnival portrayals.

Mr Attzs emphasised the need for continuity in cultural preservation, stressing that younger generations must be engaged to keep traditions alive. He noted that the event created a sense of community, as attendees shared stories and celebrated their heritage.

He also highlighted the impact of the visual arts segment, with artists from the Southern Arts Community Group in San Fernando receiving significant interest from visitors and art galleries. According to Mr Attzs, this recognition re-energised the artists and encouraged them to continue their work.

The project was funded and supported by participating artists and organisations. Mr Attzs urged the creative community to collaborate and invest in their art forms rather than relying solely on external funding. He acknowledged the





government's role in supporting cultural initiatives but encouraged artists to take proactive steps in promoting their work independently.

He also addressed the importance of affordability in the arts sector, cautioning against inflated service costs that could limit accessibility. By fostering collaboration and maintaining reasonable pricing, he argued that cultural events could remain sustainable and attract wider audiences.

Mr Attzs praised recent efforts to elevate Trinidad and Tobago's cultural presence internationally, citing initiatives such as World Steelpan Day and Machel Montano's performance at the Apollo Theater. He expressed gratitude to the UK and Trinidad and Tobago teams, the High Commission, and Women of Colour Scotland for their contributions.

Reflecting on the success of Brand TT, he emphasised that raising global awareness of Trinidad and Tobago's culture was invaluable and should continue as an ongoing effort.

achieved by encouraging participants to listen with intent to analyse, synthesise and create thus associating previously un-associated concepts. Ms. Rosalind Phillips McMillan, a senior pre-assessment nurse with the NHS, addressed the audience on how beneficial CARISO is in supporting mental health. She also spoke at the end of the event on the unexpected therapeutical and enlightening experience she gained from the session. Mr. Augustine 'Pepe' Francis MBE the president of Ebony Steelband and the president of the

British Association of the Steelband (BAS) addressed the audience expressing his honour to be involved as an official endorser of the programme. He further informed the audience that Trinidad and Tobago born, British singer and songwriter Mr. Leslie, Sebastian Charles MBE, professionally known as Billy Ocean is also an endorser of this unique programme. 

n 2023, Dr. Elaine Arnold was awarded an OBE in the King's Birthday Honours for her groundbreaking work.

A pioneer in studying the effects of separation, loss, and trauma among African Caribbean families in the UK, her work has transformed the understanding of attachment theory and its real-world implications. In 2023, members of the local community gathered to celebrate her birthday, marking both a personal milestone and her exceptional legacy.

Born in Trinidad and Tobago in 1931, Dr. Arnold's journey has been one of tireless commitment to advocating for families affected by migration and displacement. She moved to Britain in the late 1950s

to pursue postgraduate studies and later became a lecturer at Goldsmiths College and Sussex University, shaping future generations of social workers. She also served as Director of Training at Nafsiyat, an Intercultural Therapy Centre dedicated to supporting diverse communities.

Dr. Arnold's work has been instrumental in shedding light on the profound impact of family separation, loss, and trauma, particularly among West Indian migrants in Britain. Her work highlights the importance of secure early attachments and explores the challenges posed by broken attachments and traumatic reunions, issues relevant across various societal contexts and among children separated under different circumstances.

In 1999, Dr. Arnold founded Supporting Relationships and Families (SRF), previously known as the Separation and Reunion Forum, with a group of African Caribbean women who had experienced similar challenges as children. As Director of SRF, she continues to lecture widely on

the Theory of Attachment, Separation, and Loss and its relevance to the caring professions.

Her research and advocacy continue to resonate beyond the African Caribbean community, informing broader discussions on the effects of broken attachments and reunions under various circumstances, including displacement due to war, adoption, and foster care. Through her dedication to raising awareness and educating caregivers, she has become a highly respected voice in social work and psychology.

To honour her lifelong commitment to improving lives, members of the local community, friends, and colleagues came together to celebrate Dr. Arnold's birthday in 2024. The gathering was a heartfelt tribute to her work and the lasting impact she has made on countless individuals and families. It was a moment to reflect on her remarkable journey and to express gratitude for her invaluable contributions.



ne might assume that after receiving widespread acclaim for his portrayals of two iconic American figures, Mr. Kingsley Ben-Adir would readily embrace the opportunity to embody another legend, Bob Marley. However, despite earning rave reviews for his performances as Malcolm X and Barack Obama, Mr. Ben-Adir initially hesitated.

"I had a lot of reservations," he confessed to Entertainment Weekly. "I was completely convinced that there's no point in auditioning for this. I can't sing. I can't dance."

Nevertheless, after much contemplation, Mr. Ben-Adir relented and submitted an audition tape, ultimately clinching the role after a rigorous, year-long, global casting process. Yet, his casting sparked immediate backlash.

Many Jamaicans expressed frustration and disappointment that the role did not go to a Jamaican, or even one of Marley's own descendants. Hollywood's history of misrepresenting Caribbean cultures, from accents to cultural nuances, heightened the sensitivity of the casting choice.

Director Reinaldo Marcus Green, however, stood firm in his belief that they had found the right person for the job. Supported by Marley's family, including his widow Ms. Rita Marley and their children Mr. Ziggy Marley and Ms. Cedella Marley, the casting decision was backed by the producing team.

In a featurette promoting the film, Ziggy Marley, who was closely involved in the production, praised Mr. Ben-Adir for




groundbreaking discovery by Dr. Avinaash Vickram Maharaj, a scientist from Trinidad and Tobago, has shed light on a genetic cause behind a rare syndrome affecting growth, immunity, and digestive function. Named Maharaj-Storr Syndrome, after Dr. Maharaj and his collaborator Professor Helen Storr, this condition is linked to mutations in the QSOX2 gene, which plays a critical role in regulating growth, metabolism, and cellular energy production.

Dr. Maharaj, a Clinical Postdoctoral Researcher specialising in Paediatric Endocrinology, brings extensive experience in treating complex #endocrine

conditions, including those related to the growth hormone and insulin-like growth factor (GH/IGF-1) axis. His deep knowledge in hormone genetics and specific metabolic pathways, such as the glucocorticoid and sphingolipid systems, laid the groundwork for this discovery. Through precise genetic sequencing, Dr. Maharaj and his team uncovered that QSOX2 mutations disrupt crucial cellular processes tied to growth, immunity, and energy use. By identifying this gene's unexpected role in growth regulation and

mitochondrial health, he has expanded scientific understanding of how genetic changes impact multiple body systems, particularly the gut and immune response.

This discovery, published in Nature Communications, is particularly relevant for individuals suffering from short stature, immune challenges, and severe gastrointestinal symptoms. As Dr. Maharaj continues to explore the gastrointestinal implications of this syndrome, his work holds promise for new therapies, bringing hope to those affected by these complex disorders.

HONOURING A LEGACY: JUSTIN SOBION PRESENTS THE WEST INDIAN LAWYER

n the 10th July 2024, The High Commission hosted one of our nationals Justin Sobion for his "Book Talk" on The West Indian Lawyer – Keith Sobion. This book is a biography of the life and times of Justin's father Keith Sobion.

In his Book Talk, Justin traced his family roots (on both his paternal and maternal sides) to the seaside village of Mayaro in Trinidad. After

completing his A-Level examination at St Mary's College (CIC), Port of Spain, Keith was admitted to study law at the University of the West Indies (Trinidad and Barbados campuses) in 1970. In 1975, Keith and his cohorts became the first law graduates to be trained within the region. Prior to that time, if one wished to pursue a career in law in the English-speaking Caribbean, one had to be trained in the United Kingdom.

After being admitted to the Bar, Keith practised law at

JD Sellier and Company in Port of Spain. In 1991, he left private practice to pursue politics - where he was elected an MP for Ortoire/Mayaro and appointed Attorney-General and Minister of Legal Affairs of Trinidad Tobago (1991 -1995) under the Patrick Manning administration. After politics, Keith was appointed the Principal of the Norman Manley Law School at Kingston, Jamaica until his untimely demise in 2008.

As so demonstrated by Justin – Keith was well loved by all who crossed his path and garnered the respect of many. As the *Newsday* wrote about him (in 2008) –

"He (Keith) was a man more interested in ideas and civic duty than in making money. The Caribbean could use more people like him."

n Thursday 19th September Rudolph Walker CBE launched his autobiography Walking with Dignity at the High Commission in the presence of His Excellency Vishnu Dhanpaul, Baroness Patricia Scotland and other high profile guests.

Rudolph Malcolm Walker CBE is a Trinbagonian actor, best known for his roles on British television. Born and raised in Trinidad and Tobago he left bound for the United Kingdom with the aim of furthering his career at the age of 20 in 1960.

He was one of the first Black actors to be seen regularly on British television and the first Black actor to appear in a major British TV series in the 1970s sitcom Love Thy Neighbour. He has had a long and varied acting career working in film as well as television. He is currently appearing as Patrick Trueman in the BBC One TV soap opera EastEnders, in which he has acted since 2001.

Rudolph was made an Officer of the Order of the British Empire (OBE) in

2006 for his services to drama and a Commander of the British Empire (CBE) in 2020 for services to charity and drama.

Rudolph has always been a great believer in 'giving back' supporting many charities over the years including the ACLT (African Caribbean Leukaemia Trust), Prostate Cancer UK, Friends of Tafo (supporting a small Ghanaian Town), Haven Hospices, and the Sickle Cell Foundation to name but a few.

On Rudolph's 70th birthday, he launched The Rudolph Walker Foundation to nurture and develop the creative and technical skills and talents of young people. He believes that self-esteem is crucial to the development of responsibility and ambition in young people; and works to develop self-esteem through teamwork and common objectives and goals.


The Foundation runs Rudolph Walker's inter-School Drama Award (RWiSDA), competed for by schools across the UK. In addition, Rudolph Walker's Role Model Award (RWRMA) is presented to outstanding students who have contributed something special like demonstrating positive leadership, a good influence to their peers and others, and a role model within the community. The Foundation also works with young people at risk of exclusion in education and has achieved great results in this area.

In his autobiography Walking with Dignity Rudolph shares the stark realities of his early life in the Caribbean, his bold move to Britain, his struggle against the pervasive racism of the 1960s and 70s and his continued efforts to promote equality

today. Rudolph has faced immense challenges but never lost his enduring optimism or his distinctive sense of humour. Walking with Dignity examines Rudolph's pioneering contributions to British TV, highlighting his iconic roles in the controversial sitcom Love Thy Neighbour and the beloved soap EastEnders. Through these roles, Rudolph not only entertained millions but also subtly challenged and reshaped cultural perceptions.

Walking with Dignity offers an insight into the life of a man who has witnessed profound social changes and emerged with his spirit unbroken. Rudolph is a true Son of the Soul and continues to fly the flag of his beloved Trinidad and Tobago

on Ramdin's *The British Library: A Writer's Memoir* was launched at the Trinidad and Tobago High Commission on 30th October. The event was indeed a triumph.

In his 'Biographical Summary' Raymond Butler of the High Commission, opened by saying that 'Ron Ramdin's life is no ordinary story. He was born in Trinidad. and emigrted to England at the age 19 his first job was in a Library; thereafter he spent his working life in three of Britain's greatest libraries, including the British His ambition to become a Writer has been a huge undertaking; and as he wrote and published books, over the years, he lectured in Universities not only across Britain, but internationally, including the University of the Sorbonne in Paris, the University of Seville in Spain and attended many International Conferences. He has given numerous



radio and television interviews in Britain and the Caribbean and appeared often On-Camera, notably as an Historian in the double award winning film The *Unknown Soldiers*. He has been elected a Fellow of the Royal Historical Society and a Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts and a recipient of a few Awards including the 'Outstanding Achievement Award' from the Trinidad and Tobago High Commission in London.'

Given the scope and depth of Ron Ramdin's work, his writings have explored cultures and social tensions, historical and contemporary as they relate to self-discovery (essentially, respect for difference) where and what is home?'

Ramdin's novel *Rama's Voyage* is a compelling read, the prestigious *Trinidad Sunday Guardian* Book Review stated:

"The novel opens up like a painting where each character reveals a story in its own right, yet each is used to cement a powerful story. It is like a tapestry where all the threads are woven only to finally form the finished product... Melanie La Barrie's journey from a calypso singer, formerly known as Melanie Hudson, in Trinidad and Tobago to her current role as Hermes in the West End premiere of Hadestown is a captivating tale of resilience and authenticity. Born in Trinidad and Tobago, Ms. La Barrie initially found fame as a calypso singer before catching the attention of Christopher Rodriguez,

Serving as the Equity Deputy for the stage actors' union in the UK, she played a crucial role in representing the interests of her colleagues. A lfred Totesaut, known as Freddie, died on 24 March 2024 at the age of 83. He was a renowned steel pan musician, tuner, and arranger who dedicated more than 50 years to the art form, influencing generations of musicians in the UK and beyond.

Born in Trinidad in 1940, Totesaut began playing pan as a child with the Mexitones before forming his own band, Dixie Harps. He later joined Dixieland Steel Orchestra, which won the Trinidad Steel Band Music Festival in 1960 and became the first steel band to tour extensively across Europe. In 1961, he moved to England, where he continued to perform, record, and promote steel pan music.

Totesaut played with Les Flambeaux, a steel band that performed at venues such as the Royal Albert Hall, the Savoy Hotel,

and Ronnie Scott's Jazz Club. He appeared in films, television, and radio, and was one of the first steel pan musicians to perform in Africa. From the 1970s, he recorded with artists including Boney M, Fleetwood Mac, and Wham! and performed on *Top of the Pops*.

As a musician and arranger, Totesaut worked with several bands, including Metronomes Steel Orchestra, which won multiple awards under his leadership. In 1979, he performed for the then Prince Charles and once gave George Michael a steel pan lesson.

In Brent, he became known for his work with St Michael and All Angels Steel Orchestra, which was founded in 1996. He spent 16 years mentoring young musicians through the St Michael Youth Project, teaching a repertoire that ranged from classical composers like Mozart and Beethoven to Caribbean and contemporary music. Under his guidance, St Michael and All Angels became the first Brent steel band to perform at Notting Hill Carnival in 2009 and later won Best Band in 2016.


SWEET SUCCESS: TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO COCOA FARMERS EARN INTERNATIONAL RECOGNITION





THE QUEEN'S HALL AUDITORIUM OFFICIALLY NAMED THE WINIFRED ATWELL AUDITORIUM

he Queen's Hall Auditorium was officially named The Winifred Atwell Auditorium at a ceremony held on Monday 23 September 2024. On Thursday 22 August 2024, the Government of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago approved the naming of the Queen's Hall Auditorium in honour of this renowned local pianist.

Atwell, who was born and raised in

Tunapuna, enjoyed great popularity in Britain and Australia from the 1950s with a series of boogie-woogie and ragtime hits, selling over 20 million records. Born on 27 April 1915 (according to her Trinidad and Tobago Birth Certificate), Atwell was also known as Una Winifred Atwell and internationally as Winifred Atwell or "The Amazing Miss A".

It was her mother who engaged her in music, as she received her first formal piano lesson when she was two and a half years old. She began playing the piano at the age of four and within a couple of years she was giving recitals of Chopin at charity concerts. At age six, she gave piano lessons. At eight years old, she was the official organist at St Charles' Roman Catholic Church in Tunapuna.

As a young woman she worked in her father's chemist shop, and he insisted that she took a degree in pharmacy. However, in her spare time she entertained friends and continued to take part in charity concerts.

After performing in Trinidad's Services Club during World War II, Atwell went to New York to study piano technique with the celebrated classical pianist Alexander Borovsky. In 1946 she came to Britain, determined to become a concert pianist, and studied at the Royal Academy of Music. She supported herself by working in the evenings playing the piano in dance halls and clubs.

Atwell's breakthrough came in 1948 at a charity concert at the London Casino. There, she captivated the audience with her ragtime music and took several curtain calls. In 1951 she signed a contract with Decca, and in 1952 she appeared in the first Royal Variety Performance for the new queen, Elizabeth II. Atwell closed her act with 'Britannia Rag', a number she had composed specially for the occasion, and which reached Number Five in the pop charts.

By 1954, she become the first recordingartist from Britain to have three hits selling one million records: 'Black and White Rag' (1952), 'Let's Have a Party' (1953), and 'Let's Have Another Party' (1954). Between 1952 and 1960 she had no less than eleven top ten hits and at the end of the 20th century she was recognised as the most successful female instrumentalist ever to have featured in the British pop charts.

Despite her success with ragtime music, she never lost sight of her initial desire to become a concert pianist. In 1954, her recording of the eighteenth variation from Rachmaninov's Rhapsody on a Theme of Paganini reached Number Nine in the pop charts. On November 28 of that same year, Atwell packed the Royal Albert Hall as a soloist, accompanied by the London Philharmonic Orchestra, playing Grieg's piano concerto and George Gershwin's 'Rhapsody in Blue.' Atwell died in Sydney on 27 February 1983.



rinidad and Tobago participated in the 29th session of the Conference of the Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (COP29), which commenced on 11 November 2024 in Baku, Azerbaijan. The delegation highlighted the country's commitment to a greener and more inclusive society, reinforcing its role in global climate negotiations.

His Excellency Vishnu Dhanpaul, High Commissioner for Trinidad and Tobago to the United Kingdom, led the official delegation, which included the Ministry of Planning and Development. Mr. Kishan Kumarsingh, Head of the Multilateral Environmental Agreements Unit, served as Head of Delegation for Technical Negotiations. The contingent comprised representatives from the Ministry of Planning and Development, the Environmental Management

Authority (EMA), the Ministry of Labour, the Ministry of Energy and Energy Industries, the Tobago House of Assembly, as well as non-government representatives from The Cropper Foundation, Climate Analytics, the University of the West Indies, and youth representatives.



At COP29, Mr. Kumarsingh led a side event titled *Just Resilience: Just Transitions Towards a More Equal and Climate-Driven Society*, supported by Climate Strategies and the Stockholm Environmental Institute (SEI). He highlighted the severe impacts of climate change on small island developing states, including

economic instability from droughtrelated crop failure, extreme weather events, biodiversity loss, and threats to the fisheries sector.

He underscored that Trinidad and Tobago's Just Transition Policy aims to accelerate socioeconomic growth by fostering a green economy, creating new employment opportunities, and promoting cleaner energy. "It is imperative that we build resilience for every woman, man, and child and leave no one behind," he stated.

The Honourable Pennelope Beckles, Minister of Planning and Development, reiterated Trinidad and Tobago's commitment to global climate discussions, aligning with the Alliance of Small Island States (AOSIS) and the Group of 77 and China (G77 and China). She emphasised need for increased ambition in limiting global temperature rise, addressing loss and damage, and ensuring accessible climate finance, technology transfer, and capacity building.

CHICKEN PELAU

Preparation


Prep Time: 15 mins | Cook Time: 30 mins | Serves 6-8

Ingredients:

- 1 3½ lb chicken, cut into pieces
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 onion sliced
- 2 pimento peppers, seeded and chopped
- 2 tbs green seasoning paste
- 1 tbs chopped celery leaves
- 1 tbs red wine vinegar
- ¼ cup French thyme
- 4 tbs tomato ketchup
- 1 tsp salt
- 2 tbs veg oil
- 2 tbs brown sugar
- 2 cups pigeon peas
- ½ cup chopped pumpkin
- 2 cups parboiled rice
- 1 cup coconut milk
- 2 cups water

Method:

- 1. Wash chicken well with lime, drain.
- Rub on garlic, herb marinade, add fresh herbs, sliced onion and pepper, vinegar, black pepper and some salt, and ketchup cover and marinate for about 2 hours in the refrigerator.
- 3. Heat oil add sugar and caramelise to a dark brown colour, add chicken pieces one at a time turning well to colour each piece, add the rest of seasonings.
- 4. Cook uncovered until chicken starts to release its juices, about 5 minutes.
- 5. Add pigeon peas and pumpkin, stir. Lower heat and cook for about 10 minutes, covered.
- 6. Add rice and stir well.
- 7. Cover and simmer until cooked, about 20 to 30 minutes turning occasionally.
- 8. Adjust salt and serve





SHARK AND BAKE

Preparation

Prep Time: 15 mins | Cook Time: 30 mins | Serves 4-8

Shark

Ingredients:

- Breaded shark
- 1 lb shark fillets,
- 1 tsp ground chives
- 1 tbs minced c hadon beni
- 2 clove garlic, minced
- juice of one lime
- · salt and freshly ground black pepper
- flour to dredge fish
- vegetable oil for frying fish

Method:

- 1. Wash shark in flour, cut into 4-oz portions, season with herbs garlic and lime juice.
- 2. Season with salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste.
- 3. Marinate for 30 minutes.
- 4. Heat oil in frying pan, dredge fish in flour and fry until golden.
- 5. Drain and serve with floats.

Floats

Ingredients:

- 4 cups all -purpose flour
- 2 tsp yeast
- 1 tbs sugar
- 1 tbs shortening
- water
- · vegetable oil for frying

Method:

- 1. Combine flour with salt, sugar and shortening. Rub in shortening until mixture resembled fine crumbs; add enough warm water to make a soft dough.
- 2. Knead for five minutes, form into a smooth ball, cover and rest for 30 minutes until doubled in size.
- 3. Form dough into 8 balls. Let rise again for 15 minutes.
- 4. Flatten balls into 4-inch rounds.
- 5. Heat oil in a deep skillet and deep fry floats until they actually float to the top of the oil. Turn and fry until golden. Drain and serve hot
