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THE PRIME MINISTER OF THE REPUBLIC OF TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO THE HONOURABLE KAMLA PERSAD-BISSESSAR SC, MP

The Honourable Kamla Persad-Bissessar SC, MP was born on the 22nd of April, 1952. As a little girl she was always interested in reading novels and was intrigued by the developing technologies of the time. Mrs. Persad-Bissessar graduated from Iere High School and went on to further her studies at the University of the West Indies, Norwood Technical College (England,) and the Hugh Wooding Law School. Consequently, she was awarded a B.A. (Hons.), a Diploma in Education, a B.A. of Laws (Hons.) and a Legal Education Certificate. In 2006 she obtained an Executive Masters in Business Administration (EMBA) from the Arthur Lok Jack Graduate School of Business, Trinidad.

On completion of her studies, Mrs. Persad-Bissessar entered the teaching profession. Her career history can be described as people-centered and one that has always focused her energy within the public's eye. While in England pursuing studies, she worked as a social worker with the Church of England Children's Society of London. She taught at the St. Andrew High School in Kingston, Jamaica and at the Mona Campus in Jamaica. Later, she taught at the St. Augustine campus of the University of the West Indies in Trinidad. At the Jamaica College of Insurance she was also a Consultant Lecturer. Her next step was to lecture at a Tertiary Education

institution. After lecturing for a total of six years, Mrs. Persad-Bissessar then became a full-time Attorney-at-Law.

In 1987 Mrs. Persad-Bissessar entered the political arena. From 1987 until 1991, Mrs. Persad-Bissessar served as an alderman for St. Patrick County Council. Representing the United National Congress in Opposition, she took the Oath of Allegiance at a sitting of the Senate on November 1, 1994. Since 1995 she has been the Member of Parliament for Siparia, serving as Attorney General, Minister of Legal Affairs and Minister of Education between 1995 and 2001. The United National Congress returned to

the Opposition benches in 2002 and on April 26th, 2006, Mrs. Persad-Bissessar was appointed Leader of the Opposition, the first woman to ever hold that position in the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago. Mrs. Persad-Bissessar was appointed Leader of the Opposition a second time on February 25, 2010, almost one month after she was elected political leader of the United National Congress.

On Tuesday May 26, 2010, two days after a victory at the polls, Mrs. Persad-Bissessar created history yet again, becoming the first woman to hold the office of Prime Minister of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago. She would again win the Siparia seat at the 2015 and 2020 General Elections, both times serving as Opposition Leader.

On May 1, 2025, three days after her party's victory at the polls, Mrs. Persad-Bissessar took the oath of office as Prime Minister.

MEMORIAL GATES CEREMONY MARKS 80TH ANNIVERSARY OF WWII

On 10 March 2025, a wreath-laying ceremony took place at London's Memorial Gates to honour the Commonwealth men and women who served with the British Armed Forces during the First and Second World Wars. The Memorial Gates, inaugurated by Queen Elizabeth II in 2002, recognise the 5 million volunteers from the Indian subcontinent, Africa, the Pacific Islands, the Caribbean and Nepal. They also celebrate the ongoing contributions of Commonwealth families and Nepal to the diversity of British society.

The year 2025 marked the 80th anniversary of the end of World War II. The Rt Hon Lord Boateng CVO, Chairman of the Memorial Gates Council, welcomed attendees. Sir Ben Okri read a poem, followed by a speech from Justin Maciejewski DSO MBE and a prayer by The Rt Rev Canon Dr. Anderson Jeremiah, Bishop of Edmonton.

Wreaths were laid by dignitaries on behalf of His Majesty the King, the Lord Lieutenant of Greater London, the House of Commons, the Commonwealth, and veterans. COMMONWEALTH COMMEMORATES 76 YEARS

FROM INDENTURESHIP TO DIASPORA: NARRATIVES OF MIGRATION AND SOUTH ASIAN IDENTITY

On 14th October 2025, Northumbria University, in partnership with North East Museums, hosted the international conference From Indentureship to Diaspora: Narratives of Migration and South Asian Identity. The High Commission of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago in London is proud to highlight this important scholarly and cultural event, which explored the histories, genealogies, and enduring legacies of Indian indentureship and the global South Asian diaspora.

A central focus of the conference was the experience of descendants of indentured labourers, whose journeys shaped societies across the Caribbean, the Indian Ocean, Africa and beyond. Particular emphasis was placed on Trinidad and Tobago, where the legacy of indentureship remains foundational to national identity, culture and social development. The conference also explored later patterns of migration that forged enduring links between former colonies and regions such as the North East of England.

Reflecting on the significance of the discussions, Her Excellency Ms. Urvashi Ramnarine, Acting High Commissioner for the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago to the United Kingdom, noted: *“Understanding the legacy of indentureship is essential to appreciating the rich diversity of Trinidad and Tobago and its diaspora. Conferences such as this ensure these histories remain visible, relevant and shared across generations.”*

The conference was brought to fruition through the leadership of a Trinidadian academic and cultural advocate, ensuring Caribbean perspectives were meaningfully embedded within the programme. This helped centre Indo-Caribbean lived experience, scholarship and cultural memory within wider global discussions on migration and identity.

Discussions also examined the North East of England’s historic role in shipbuilding, including vessels used in the transportation of indentured labourers across the British Empire. By linking local and global histories, the conference encouraged inclusive heritage

interpretation, further research and community engagement.

A career diplomat, Acting High Commissioner Ms. Urvashi Ramnarine had previously served at Trinidad and Tobago’s High Commission in India, the Consulate General in New York, and as Director for the Americas Division at the Ministry of Foreign and CARICOM Affairs. Her presence underscored Trinidad and Tobago’s leadership in diaspora engagement, cultural diplomacy, and the preservation of shared historical memory.

INSPIRATIONAL WOMEN TRAIL: DR. BEVERLEY PREVATT-GOLDSTEIN – FEATURED AT NORTHUMBRIA UNIVERSITY

The We Are Here: Inspirational Women Trail, created by the community-led Exchange Steering Group, highlights 16 women who shaped the North East in medicine, science, academia and activism. Dr. Beverley Prevatt-Goldstein is featured for her work in racial justice, social work and community leadership. The trail is part of the Exchange project, funded in 2022 by the Arts and Humanities Research Council and led by National Museums Scotland and the National Maritime Museum.



Dr. Beverley Prevatt-Goldstein was born in Belmont, Trinidad, in 1950. Following the death of her mother in 1959, she migrated to England with her two sisters. While her elder siblings attended boarding school, Beverley lived with her aunt and uncle, an experience she recalls as formative, grounded in education, church life and community values.

An outstanding student, she became one of the first Black British women to study at the University of Oxford in 1968, earning a BA (Hons) in History. At a time when there were few Black students and no Black lecturers, she became active in anti-apartheid movements and served as Treasurer of the Joint Action Committee Against Racial Intolerance. These experiences shaped her lifelong commitment to racial justice and led her into social work.

In the early 1990s, Dr. Prevatt-Goldstein relocated to Newcastle and joined Durham University as a lecturer in social work. She trained generations of professionals in foster care, anti-racism and equality, and worked closely with foster carers through the

Fostering Network. She also contributed to the work of the British Association of Social Workers and the General Social Care Council.

In 2001, she became the first Chief Executive Officer of the Black Ethnic Community Organisations Network, advocating for the Black voluntary sector at regional strategic level. She later chaired the North East of England African Community Association.

Dr. Prevatt-Goldstein has authored over 25 academic papers and continues her legacy through the African Lives in Northern England project. She is also featured in the Discovery Museum's Inspirational Women Trail.

TRANSPLANT LINKS COMMUNITY STRENGTHENING UK-TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO PARTNERSHIP IN KIDNEY TRANSPLANT CARE

A meeting introducing the partnership between Transplant Links Community (TLC) and the National Organ Transplant Unit of Trinidad and Tobago (NOTU), supported by The Samworth Foundation, was held on November 17, 2025 at the Trinidad and Tobago High Commission, London. The Patron of Transplant Links, Trinidad and Tobago's very own Baroness Floella Benjamin OM DBE DL, led the meeting.

The partnership aims to develop sustainable living-donor kidney transplant programs in Trinidad and Tobago through ongoing skill transfer, teaching, and support from NHS specialists. This initiative builds on past efforts by the NOTU, which has been performing renal transplants in Trinidad and Tobago since 2006. The collaboration highlights a commitment to medical education and health initiatives that can deliver transformational change in healthcare provision globally.

The Samworth Foundation is sponsoring the current UK-based training of Dr. Namorah Bobb, a surgeon from Trinidad and Tobago, originally based at the Eric Williams Hospital, Mt Hope, Trinidad and Tobago.

Transplant Links Community (TLC) is a UK registered charity that provides hands on training and mentoring in kidney transplantation for healthcare professionals in low and middle-income countries.

TLC originally started in 2007 as a grassroots community comprised of a small group of healthcare professionals who used their annual leave to travel to share their skills with colleagues in LMICs. It is now an international organisation with a medical faculty of over 50 volunteer clinicians working collaboratively with a network of emerging transplant units all over the world. The aim is to assist in the development of sustainable, ethical living-donor transplant units so that more patients around the world can have access to this life saving treatment.

The Charity works with partner countries like Trinidad and Tobago to provide tailored support, hands-on surgical assistance, skill transfer during in-country visits, placements and observerships for healthcare professionals in established UK transplant units. The Charity also helps with developing necessary infrastructure, patient information materials, and online educational resources. The Charity also lobbies government officials to ensure

long-term support and sustainability of transplant programs. his initiative builds on past efforts by the NOTU, which has been performing renal transplants in Trinidad and Tobago since 2006.

The Samworth Foundation is an independent, family grant-making charitable trust based in the East Midlands, UK, which funds projects in the United Kingdom and internationally. The Foundation was established in 1973 by Sir David and Rosemary Samworth.

Since its inception the Foundation has supported a wide range of projects and organisations, including the establishment and development of three academies across Leicestershire and Nottinghamshire, work to tackle the exploitation and abuse of women and children, the protection and restoration of our natural world, and emergency responses to people facing humanitarian crisis.

Now working with the next generation of Samworth family members, with the aim of supporting the following generation with their giving, the Foundation continues to provide funding to organisations making a real difference to the wellbeing of people and the environment. The Samworth Trust's sponsorship of the fellowship demonstrates a commitment to medical education and health initiatives that can deliver transformational change in healthcare provision.

A TRIBUTE TO THREE CENTENARIANS: TINA APARICIO, PRINCE ALBERT JACOB AND SHEILA YVONNE RAMSAY

As Trinidad and Tobago continues to celebrate the enduring legacy of its people overseas, the High Commission in London pays tribute to three remarkable centenarians whose lives reflect service, resilience and an unwavering connection to their homeland. Tina Aparicio, Prince Albert Jacob and Sheila Yonne Ramsay each represent a generation that helped shape modern Britain while carrying Trinidadian values across borders.



Albertina Aparicio: A Legacy of Care and Service

Born in Trinidad on 31 January 1925, Ms. Albertina Aparicio dedicated her life to education, healthcare and community service, leaving a remarkable legacy that spanned continents and generations. She began her professional journey as a teacher before migrating to the United Kingdom in 1958 to train as a nurse, responding to Britain's post-war need for skilled professionals.

Arriving in Plymouth at the age of 33, Ms. Aparicio secured her first nursing post with the support of a close friend and went on to complete her training in general nursing and midwifery. Her career as a midwife was defined by compassion, resilience and professionalism. Over the course of her service, she delivered more than 2,000 babies, many through home births, providing reassurance and care to families at some of life's most significant moments.

As a member of the Windrush generation, Ms. Aparicio faced racial discrimination within the NHS, yet she remained steadfast in her commitment

to her profession and the communities she served. Her work took her across Essex as a community midwife, where she was promoted to Sister and played an important role in training future midwives. She also worked at the Royal Free Hospital in London and later returned briefly to Trinidad before continuing her career in the UK.

Ms. Aparicio retired in 1988 at the age of 63 and remained a respected and admired figure in her community. She celebrated her 100th birthday in January 2025 and passed away in April 2025. Her contributions to the NHS, Caribbean heritage in Britain, and the many lives she touched will be remembered with deep gratitude and respect.

Prince Albert Jacob: Royal Air Force Veteran and Windrush Pioneer

Mr. Prince Albert "Jake" Jacob was born in Port of Spain in 1925 and, at just 17 years old, volunteered to serve in the Royal Air Force during the Second World War. Selected in Jamaica, he travelled to the United States for specialist training before being posted to Britain, where he served at Royal Air Force (RAF) Kirkham, Burtonwood and Carlisle as part of the ground crew responsible for aircraft maintenance and logistics.

Following the war, Mr. Jacob returned to Trinidad and Tobago but found limited opportunities despite his service. In 1947, he resettled in Britain, becoming one of the earliest members of the Windrush generation. His post-war life was marked by resilience in the face of racism and social exclusion, particularly after marrying Mary, a White British woman, in 1953. Together they built a life in Birmingham, overcoming hostility to establish a stable and loving family home.

Professionally, Mr. Jacob enjoyed a successful career at the Post Office, rising to the rank of Inspector and supervising a large team. Beyond work, he distinguished himself as an accomplished athlete, winning regional sprint titles and representing Great Britain at the 1950 Maccabiah Games in

Israel, where he earned two silver medals.

In retirement, he continued to serve through voluntary work with the probation service. Now one of the last surviving Caribbean RAF veterans of the Second World War, Prince Albert Jacob stands as a powerful symbol of service, dignity and perseverance.

Prince Albert Jacob's 100th birthday was celebrated on 15 July 2025 by the National Windrush Museum in collaboration with the Royal Air Force Benevolent Fund, attended by senior Royal Navy, Army, and RAF personnel and specially invited guests.



Sheila Yvonne Ramsay: Matriarch, Entrepreneur and Legacy Keeper

Mrs. Sheila Yvonne Ramsay, a proud Trinidad and Tobago-born citizen, celebrates 100 years defined by family, enterprise and cultural continuity. Born and raised in Trinidad, she later migrated to the United Kingdom, settling in Kensal Rise, London in the early 1960s. Her early years in Britain were shaped by both joy and hardship, including the tragic loss of her mother during a visit to London amid the infamous smog.

A devoted mother and determined provider, Mrs. Ramsay worked as a home help for Westminster Council while raising her children. Her entrepreneurial spirit soon emerged. In the 1970s, she established her own business, most memorably operating an ice cream van during a turbulent period in Notting Hill's history. Her quick thinking during the 1976 unrest ensured her family's safety and reflected her strength under pressure.

Over the decades, Mrs. Ramsay balanced business with family life,

becoming a grandmother and later a great-grandmother. She remained active well into retirement, trading at markets and travelling regularly between Trinidad and the UK. Despite experiencing significant personal loss and a diagnosis of vascular dementia in later life, she continues to engage with family, music and community through day centres and regular interaction.

Mrs. Ramsay's wider family legacy includes military service in the RAF during the Second World War and notable contributions to Caribbean cultural history in Britain and Trinidad and Tobago. Today, she is cherished as the matriarch and bedrock of her family, a living testament to resilience, love and Trinbagonian pride.

Independence reshaped national identity, connecting Trinbagonians at home and abroad while maintaining strong people-to-people links with Britain.

Although the examinations were completed in 2023, the award was formally presented at a felicitation ceremony held earlier this month in Belfast, Ireland.

At the ceremony, Dr. Seetahal-Maraj presented the UK's first and largest case series on fetoscopic repair of neural tube defects, underscoring his contribution to advancing neurosurgical practice and research.

T&T SCOTTISH POET ANTHONY VAHNI CAPILDEO WINS WINDHAM-CAMPBELL PRIZE

On 3 March 2025, Trinidadian-Scottish poet Anthony Vahni Capildeo was announced as a recipient of the Windham-Campbell Prize, one of the world's most prestigious literary awards, valued at US\$175,000.

The Windham-Campbell Prizes honour eight writers globally each year for outstanding achievement across four categories: fiction, non-fiction, poetry and drama.

Capildeo was recognised for their distinguished body of work, including the Forward Prize-winning and T.S. Eliot Prize-shortlisted *Measures of Expatriation*.

Their writing is acclaimed for its precision and depth, and for its engagement with themes of belonging, identity and gender.

This recognition continues Trinidad and Tobago's strong legacy within the Windham-Campbell Prizes. Previous recipients include Marlene Nourbese Philip (Poetry, 2024), Dionne Brand (Fiction, 2021) and André Alexis (Fiction, 2017).

OPERA SINGER ANNE FRIDAL PERFORMS AT WINDSOR CASTLE FOR COMMONWEALTH STUDY CONFERENCE DINNER

Soprano Ms. Anne Fridal was invited to perform for an audience of distinguished leaders from across the Commonwealth at the 2025 Commonwealth Study Conference (CSC) Presidential Council Appreciation Dinner, held on 15 April at Windsor Castle. The event celebrated leadership, service, and the enduring legacy of the Duke of Edinburgh's Commonwealth Study Conferences, founded in 1956.

Hosted by Her Royal Highness Princess Anne, Patron-in-Chief of the CSC, the dinner brought together alumni and emerging leaders from diverse sectors to reflect on leadership, industry, and community engagement. Introductory remarks were delivered by Major David Clarke CVO, Director of the Commonwealth Study Conferences Canada. Inspiring remarks followed from

Mr. Agnes Di Leonardi, President of CSC Canada; Mr. Wes Hall, Jamaican business leader; and Ms. Shirley Ayorkor Botchwey, Secretary-General Elect of the Commonwealth.

During the programme, Ms. Fridal showcased the culture and artistry of Trinidad and Tobago. Her repertoire spanned opera, musical theatre, and a medley of "Calypsopera", a form she

created to present Calypso in an operatic style, featuring works by Aldwyn Roberts (*The Lord Kitchener*). She also briefly spoke with Princess Anne about the beauty, art, and cultural heritage of Trinidad and Tobago.

Ms. Fridal shared that she was captivated by the historical portraits, grandeur, and traditions of Windsor Castle, bringing a Caribbean voice to a celebration of Commonwealth leadership and international collaboration.

DR. MARSHA PEARCE TAKES PIONEERING RESEARCH PROJECT TO THE FITZWILLIAM MUSEUM CAMBRIDGE

The highly competitive award, valued at £881,950, supports internationally recognised scholars undertaking cutting-edge research in the United Kingdom. As part of the four-year appointment, Dr. Pearce formally joined the Fitzwilliam Museum and the University of Cambridge in September 2025.

Her project explores questions of belonging, representation, and institutional transformation, reimagining

museums as inclusive spaces of care and engagement for Global Majority artists. Central to the research is the strengthening of academic and creative relationships between the Caribbean and the United Kingdom, ensuring Caribbean perspectives are embedded within international cultural institutions.

Dr. Pearce holds a PhD in Cultural Studies and a Bachelor's degree in Visual Arts from the University of the West Indies. She has held senior academic leadership roles at UWI and contributed to cultural policy and museum governance in Trinidad and Tobago. Her curatorial work includes collaborations with major international institutions and exhibitions. She has published widely across Caribbean studies, visual culture and diaspora scholarship.

SHAKA HISLOP RECOGNISED AT DOWNING STREET FOR ANTI-RACISM LEADERSHIP

Trinidad and Tobago-born former international footballer and broadcaster Shaka Hislop was honoured for his contribution to anti-racism advocacy at the Show Racism the Red Card (SRtRC) Hall of Fame induction ceremony, held at 10 Downing Street on 2 June 2025. The event, hosted by UK Prime Minister The Rt Hon Sir Keir Starmer MP, recognised Mr. Hislop's pioneering role in co-founding SRtRC in 1996, a charity that has reached more than 1.3 million people across schools, workplaces, and football stadiums in the UK.

Prime Minister Starmer commended both the charity's impact and Mr. Hislop's leadership in using education and sport to challenge racism. Referencing the racist abuse faced by members of England's national football team after the Euro

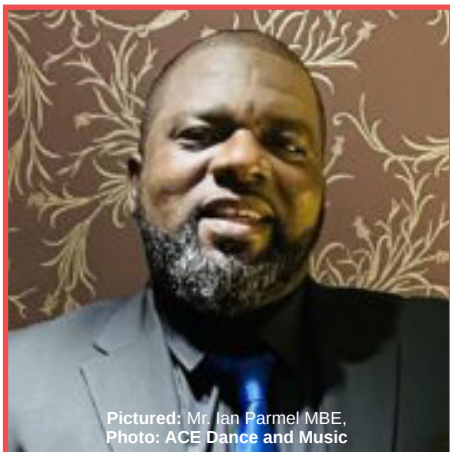
2021 final, the Prime Minister said: “Just as we think that we’ve made great strides forward, there’s a brutal reminder: not so fast. Don’t be complacent.”

He added: “*You’re not just invited to be here — you are entitled to be here. Put your fingerprints on the next policy... to make sure that we together shape a better future.*” Highlighting football’s broader role, the Prime Minister noted: “*Football is for everyone. It gives people a leg up with*

skills, employability, and confidence,” citing initiatives such as Arsenal’s Twinning Project and the Dirt Is Good campaign as examples of sport fostering social impact. Mr. Hislop’s work with SRtRC uses football and education to promote inclusion, challenge discrimination, and raise awareness about the importance of equality in sport and society. The charity continues to engage communities across the UK, inspiring young people and equipping them with the knowledge

and confidence to combat racism. Established in 1996, Show Racism the Red Card remains the UK’s leading anti-racism educational charity, with Mr. Hislop’s decades-long commitment continuing to shape its vision. His recognition at Downing Street celebrates his leadership and the charity’s sustained impact on education, sport, and society.

Under Mr. Parmel’s leadership, ACE Dance and Music has become a leading national force in dance, promoting African diaspora dance forms and raising aspirations among Black young people. Many successful artists, including Jamaal Burkmar, Rudi Cole, Júlia Robert Parés, Xhosa Cole, and Iona Waite, have been mentored and influenced by his vision.

Mr. Parmel said, “*I am truly honoured and humbled to receive this recognition. Coming from a small village in Trinidad, my journey in the arts has been long and rewarding. I share this honour with*

my fellow artists, collaborators, young people, and everyone who has supported ACE Dance and Music over the years.” Mr. Paul Udenze, Chair of ACE Dance and Music, added, “*Ian’s dedication and vision have made a profound impact on the arts community. This well-deserved honour reflects his tireless commitment to excellence and the inspiration he continues to provide to artists and young people alike.*”

Looking ahead, Mr. Parmel remains focused on creating new opportunities for future generations, including the development of performance and studio spaces to ensure ACE’s legacy continues to grow. ACE Dance and Music, a valued National Portfolio organisation supported by Arts Council England, is recognised as one of the UK’s leading dance organisations.

Illuminated portraits at bus stops across North Paddington are celebrating residents who make a positive impact as part of Westminster City Council’s Local Heroes campaign. The initiative highlights individuals whose dedication strengthens care, safety, and opportunity across the city.

Mt Carl Gabriel, a Trinidad and Tobago carnival technician, is renowned for his wire-bending and papier-mâché creations, including a mermaid costume for the Junior Queen of Paddington Arts made from recycled materials. Dr. Phaedra Rampersad, an emergency medicine physician from Trinidad and Tobago, has had her case report, *Atraumatic Grade Five Renal Injury*, published in the British Medical Journal (BMJ). The report details a rare and complex case encountered in the Emergency Department that initially appeared minor but revealed life-threatening internal injuries, highlighting the importance of vigilance in emergency care.

Dr. Rampersad, brings extensive experience in acute care, trauma management, and emergency diagnostics. Her publication demonstrates how subtle clinical signs can mask serious conditions,

offering critical learning points for clinicians worldwide and helping prevent potential life-threatening mistakes.

Reflecting on the case, she said, "Emergency medicine is full of cases that appear ordinary and suddenly aren't. This particular encounter stayed with me long after my shift ended. Sharing what I learned with the wider medical fraternity can help avoid life-threatening mistakes."

Dr. Rampersad also highlighted how her Trinidad and Tobago upbringing shaped her approach to medicine. "Growing up in a small, diverse, and community-oriented society teaches you to see patients as individuals with stories, families,

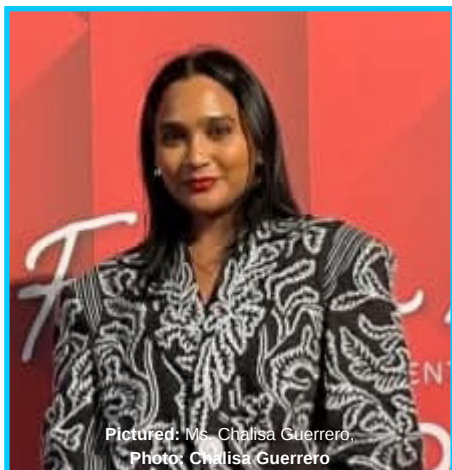
and cultural layers — not just as cases. Limited resources encourage creativity, critical thinking, and teamwork. And our national watchwords — discipline, production, and tolerance — are values I carry into my practice every day."

She added advice for aspiring clinicians: "Don't ever forget where you come from. Seek mentors, ask questions, and hold on to the values you grew up with. Medicine is demanding, but it is also a calling rooted in service, compassion, and lifelong learning." Dr. Rampersad also credited the faith instilled in her upbringing: "Without God, I am nothing. The prayers of my family and ancestors have carried me this far."

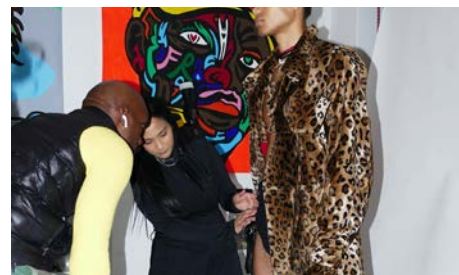

Selected from a pool of 90,000 applicants, these scholars exemplify

- Ronald Ammon, initially on the reserve list, was upgraded to full scholarship and will pursue Engineering Management at University College London.

the scholars. From casual matches with her brothers to the global stage, Ms. Shivana Sookdeo's esports journey reflects passion, precision and perseverance. The Trinidad and Tobago competitor began gaming at age five and made her competitive debut in 2014 with Tekken Tag Tournament 2. Over the years, she has achieved notable placements at major regional events, including:

- Fight Fest (2015) – 2nd place
- Alias Expo (2015) – 3rd place
- Baddest Man in T&T (2018) – 1st place
- Game On VII (2018) – 2nd place

- Galactakon / Great Gaming Lounge (2023) – 1st place
- Abena Tournament: Guadeloupe Edition (2025, All Female Tekken 8) – 1st place

Her victory in Guadeloupe earned her the title of Caribbean Women's Champion and the opportunity to represent the region at EVO France 2025, the first European edition of the world's most prestigious fighting game event held in Nice. At EVO France, Ms. Sookdeo competed against elite players from around the world in Tekken 8



and other titles, where she placed Top 16, marking a historic achievement for a Caribbean female gamer. The overall tournament was won by top international competitors such as Arslan Ash of Pakistan in the Tekken division.

Reflecting on her journey, Ms. Sookdeo said that competitive gaming requires analytical thinking, strategy and deep knowledge, and that being part of the EVO experience was a milestone for her and for Esports in Trinidad and Tobago. She continues to advocate for greater sponsorship and support for local players, noting that enhanced funding and opportunities are key to growing the community and enabling more Caribbean competitors to reach international stages.

SYBIL MARJORY ATTECK (1911–1975): TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO'S LEADING 20TH-CENTURY MODERNIST

Sybil Marjory Atteck, BFA CMG (1911–1975) is recognized both nationally and internationally as Trinidad and Tobago's leading 20th century modernist artist, groundbreaking female artist, and as the first National Grand Master of Art during the 1960's and early 1970's. Atteck firmly established, secured, and influenced the nation's fine arts capabilities and capacity pre-, during, and post-independence. For her lifetime of accomplishment, leadership, and eminent contribution to the advancement of Fine Arts in Trinidad and Tobago Atteck received the Chaconia Medal (Gold) in 1973. In the years after her death Atteck's legacy and art have endured. Atteck's artworks have continually been featured in major national art collections, on her nation's postage stamps, at numerous national events, and at local and international art exhibitions.

Atteck was not only an accomplished artist, but a highly qualified art teacher, instructing and guiding thousands of the nation's youth and emerging artists. She was Art Mistress at St. Joseph's Convent in San Fernando, St. Joseph's Convent in Port of Spain, Bishop Anstey High School (BAHS), Holy Name Convent and St. Francois Girls' College in Port of Spain. She taught art classes at the Trinidad Art Society, as well as the Extramural Department of the University of the West Indies and lectured at numerous Art Centres across the Caribbean.

Atteck's art has been featured in a publication by Phaidon Press entitled *Great Women Painters*, 2022, that surveyed over 300 painters from over

60 countries, spanning 5 centuries and included Sybil Atteck among only three women from the Caribbean region. Several recent major art exhibitions that features Atteck include: The 2017 - 2018 exhibition entitled *Circles and Circuits*, in Los Angeles, California, USA; in 2021 at the 100th anniversary of Bishop Anstey High School; in 2021, *Fragments of Epic Memory* at the Art Gallery of Ontario, Canada; and 2021, *MAS ALLA, EL MAR CANTA (Beyond, the Sea Sings)* at the Times Art Centre in Berlin, Germany, and most recently a retrospective exhibition featuring over 90 artworks was presented at the Art Gallery of Burlington, Ontario, Canada.

Atteck's legacy is three-fold. First, there are her collective artworks which reflect the nation of Trinidad and Tobago. Second, there is the Art Society of Trinidad and Tobago which is the first formal arts-based institution of its kind, and oldest continuously active society for over 80 years, in Trinidad and Tobago. Third, there are the multitude of artists that were either her students or were influenced and encouraged to come to the forefront of the art community in Trinidad and Tobago and the British Caribbean. Fourth, and most importantly, Atteck accomplished many first for her nation:

First to become a professional artist in her nation's history. First to hold a Solo Exhibition in the history of Trinidad and Tobago in 1948, First to accomplish 3 solo exhibitions in three continental regions in a single year, and first Caribbean artist to show at the Royal Academy in London England in 1955, to name a few.

Her nephew, Mr. Keith Atteck, has been researching and documenting the life and artistic legacy for the past half a decade and documented over 740 of her artworks and is writing a detailed biographic text. His trip to England in June 2025 discovered another 10 artworks and photographed the two beautiful paintings at the Trinidad and Tobago High Commission in London. It is thanks to the staff, including Mrs. Beverley Reviero-Awonaya, Public

Affairs, Culture and Tourism Department of the High Commission and the support of the Acting High Commissioner Ms. Urvashi Ramnarine that these artworks can be incorporated into a comprehensive database documenting the artistic legacy of Atteck and her contribution to Trinidad and Tobago. Keith hopes to publish his manuscript in conjunction with a major exhibition in England in the next few years with the support of the High Commission and other sponsors.

As part of Black History Month 2025, JUST INCARNIVAL Arts and Culture presented Carnival Unplugged III, a sold-out performance at Arts Depot in North London that marked Joshua Regrello's first live show in London.

The evening featured the Trinidad and Tobago steelpan musician, who is also the Guinness World Record holder for the longest continuous steelpan performance — a 31-hour marathon set on 27 December 2024. Hosted in the Studio

Theatre, the programme used live music and storytelling to explore the history of Carnival and the cultural significance of the steelpan across the Caribbean.

The production blended steelpan showcases, unplugged acoustic pieces, and spoken reflections, offering audiences an intimate and educational experience. Guest performers soprano Anne Fridal, soca artist Triniboi Joocie, JIC Steelpan Academy, vocalist Amy Thomas and theatre dancer Valeria Alexandra, who brought her own artistic style to the stage, added further musical texture to the programme, contributing to a rich and varied celebration of Carnival arts.

Founded in 2022, JUST INCARNIVAL Arts and Culture is a North London-based organisation dedicated to preserving and sharing Caribbean Carnival traditions in the UK. Its work spans masquerade, steelpan, calypso, and soca through performances, workshops, and community engagement. Held on Saturday 11 October 2025, Carnival Unplugged III sold out ahead of the performance, reflecting strong public interest. Following the show, on his social media accounts Joshua Regrello described the night as a milestone moment in his career and expressed gratitude for the opportunity to make his London debut.

BLUE PLAQUE TO HONOUR T&T'S ICON AND ACTIVIST CLAUDIA VERA JONES

Trinidad and Tobago High Commission was proud to be part of the celebrations which took place at Camden Council Town Hall on Thursday 26th June to honour Claudia Vera Jones with a Blue Plaque.

The blue plaque celebrates the UK's first Caribbean Carnival, which took place at Camden Town Hall on 30 January 1959 – a ground-breaking national event that later inspired the iconic Notting Hill Carnival.

Claudia Vera Jones, born in colonial Trinidad on 21 February 1915, is one of Trinidad and Tobago's pioneering activists, representing a string of such nationals who have contributed and continue to contribute to life in the UK.

During the 1950s, amid rising racial tensions which escalated into the Notting Hill riots, activist Claudia Jones organised the first Caribbean Carnival to provide a joyful, defiant safe space for cultural expression and community resilience.

Held at the Town Hall and televised by the BBC, the carnival featured steel bands, calypso singing, a beauty pageant, a banquet of food and many more Caribbean traditions. The carnival was so successful it continued in London for five years, eventually inspiring the Notting Hill Carnival – one of the world's largest street festivals, attracting millions of visitors and contributing £93million to London's economy every year.

The Trinidad and Tobago High Commission was represented by Mrs. Beverley Reviero-Awonaya and Mr. Lawson Lovell, Public Affairs, Culture and Tourism Division at the unveiling of the Blue Plaque honouring Claudia Jones for the UK's first ever Caribbean Carnival.

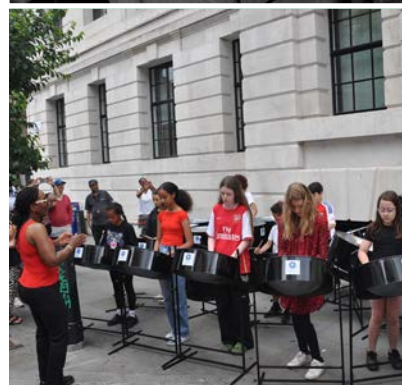

BLUE PLAQUE TO HONOUR T&T'S MUSICIAN AND PIONEER HAROLD "LORD WOODBINE" PHILLIPS

A commemorative blue plaque was unveiled on Friday 29 August 2025, at The Jacaranda, Liverpool, to honour Mr. Harold Adolphus Phillips, professionally known as Lord Woodbine.

Born in Trinidad and Tobago in 1929, Lord Woodbine came to Britain in 1943 and served as a Royal Air Force flight engineer during the Second World War. Returning on the HMT Empire #Windrush in 1948, he later settled in Liverpool where he

performed as a musician, #calypsonian, composer, and band leader, and managed The Jacaranda Club.

Lord Woodbine was a pioneering figure in Britain's post-war cultural landscape and played an important role in shaping the early music career of The Beatles. He was the first singer-songwriter John Lennon and Paul McCartney encountered and helped create the musical environment that inspired their earliest songs.

The unveiling ceremony included contributions from Mr. Graham Stanley, Managing Director at The Jacaranda, Mr. Hudson Phillips and Mrs. Carol Phillips, Lord Woodbine's children, Councillor Barbara Murray, Lord Mayor of Liverpool, Mr. Arthur Torrington CBE of the Windrush Foundation, and Dr. James McGrath of Leeds Beckett University. Calypsonian Alexander D' Great performed "Song for Lord Woodbine", and Mr. Tony Henry, the journalist who produced a radio documentary about Lord Woodbine in 1998, also spoke.

WINIFRED ATWELL HONOURED WITH ENGLISH HERITAGE BLUE PLAQUE

The Trinidad and Tobago High Commission was proud to join celebrations in London on Wednesday 1st October 2025 as internationally renowned pianist Winifred Atwell was honoured with an English Heritage Blue Plaque.

The plaque marks 18 Bourdon Street, Mayfair, where Atwell lived at the height of her extraordinary career in the 1950s and 60s with her husband and manager, Lew Levisohn. According to English Heritage, it was here she kept her two most famous instruments: her Steinway concert grand and her beloved 'other piano' – a deliberately out-of-tune upright that became her signature in countless honky-tonk performances.

Winifred Atwell, born in Tunapuna, Trinidad and Tobago, in c.1910, was a trailblazing musician and the first black artist to top the UK charts. Her electrifying ragtime and boogie-woogie style, paired with classical virtuosity, made her a household name. She spent 117 weeks in the British pop charts between 1952 and 1960, appeared on over 100 BBC radio programmes, and fronted her own shows on ITV and BBC television. Her energetic rendition of the 'Black and White Rag' later became the theme tune for the BBC snooker programme Pot Black.

YolanDa Brown OBE DL, musician, broadcaster, and English Heritage blue plaques panel member, said: "Winifred Atwell

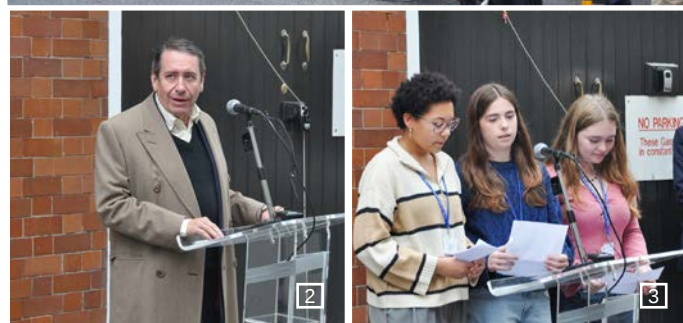
was a dazzling performer and a true trailblazer. Her virtuosity, charisma and entrepreneurial spirit broke racial and musical barriers in mid-century Britain. This plaque in Mayfair – close to her recording studios, television sets and business premises – is a tribute to a woman whose legacy deserves far greater recognition in British music.”

Jools Holland OBE DL, pianist, bandleader and broadcaster, said: “Winifred Atwell is very important in British cultural and musical life. She is one of the first women, and certainly one of the first women of Afro-Caribbean heritage to become a mainstream figure in 1950s British entertainment. She was also a piano inspiration to both Sir Elton John, myself, and many others. It is therefore a tremendous personal honour for me to help celebrate her legacy with a blue plaque.”

Beyond her musical achievements, Atwell was a forward-thinking entrepreneur. She opened one of the UK’s first salons for black women and launched a line of beauty products, drawing on her earlier training as a pharmacist. Her success and public profile made her an inspiration, especially to the Caribbean diaspora in Britain and Australia, where she later settled.

The unveiling, which celebrated Winifred Atwell's enduring legacy as a pioneering performer, entrepreneur, and cultural icon, was attended by a delegation from the Trinidad and Tobago High Commission. Its representatives included Acting High Commissioner Ms. Urvashi Ramnarine, Mrs. Beverley Reviero-Awonaya, and Mr. Lawson Lovell.

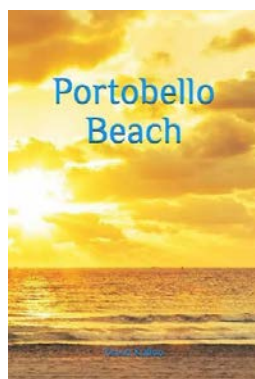
A number of drinks were available, including Rum Punch, Sorrel Rum Punch, Carib, and Sorrel drink. Other tourism items were given away at the booth.

The 11th Steelpan and Carnival Arts Conference, held from 6–8 March 2025 at the National Academy for the Performing Arts (NAPA), marked a historic homecoming for a conference series that began in

London in 2006. Founded by Nostalgia Steelband and later expanded to include Carnival Arts, the conference was staged in Trinidad and Tobago for the first time, in partnership with the University of Trinidad and Tobago (UTT) and the International Carnival Conference Committee (ICCC).

Under the theme *Carnival Interconnections and Reconnections; Cultural Cadence: Steelpan, Calypso and Mas and the Global Diaspora Connection*, the three-day gathering brought together scholars, practitioners, tuners, performers and cultural visionaries from across the globe. With over 50 academic papers, four plenary lectures, workshops and film screenings, the programme examined steelpan innovation, calypso's lyrical power, masquerade traditions, African retentions and the evolving "Orange Economy."

A major highlight was the premiere of the documentary *Ellie Mannette: A Destiny in Steel*, followed by an electrifying live performance from the legendary Shell Invaders Steel Orchestra (Youth and Stage Sides). Their stirring rendition of *Stand By Me*, joined by master arranger Dr. Ray Holman, transformed the auditorium into a celebration of heritage and pride.

The conference opened with addresses from Dr.

Kela Francis (UTT), Prof. Clement Imbert, and Prof. Haroun Shah, who called for deeper diasporic collaboration through a global "famalay" network. Plenary speakers included Prof. Dawn Batson, Dr. Christopher Laird, Dr. Ray Holman and Mr. Ansel Wong CBE.

Visually striking was Ms. Melissa Lee Foon's floral stage installation, *A Tribute to the Power of Pan*, symbolising Carnival's fleeting yet enduring beauty.

The conference concluded with plans announced for the 12th gathering in London in July 2026, commemorating TASPO at 75, ensuring that the global dialogue on Pan and Carnival continues.

DOCUMENTARY ON PETER MINSHALL WINS AWARD AND SCREENED AT CANNES FILM FESTIVAL'S FIRST CARIBBEAN DAY

In May 2025, Caribbean cinema marked a significant milestone when the documentary *The Tall Boy*, about Trinidadian Carnival icon Peter Minshall, was screened at the first Caribbean Day held at Pavillon Afriques during the Cannes Film Festival. The event took place on 21 May 2025 and showcased Caribbean storytelling alongside regional films, panels, and industry networking.

Prior to its screening at Caribbean Day, *The Tall Boy* won Best Documentary at the 2025 Diversity in Cannes Short Film and Webseries Showcase on 19 May 2025 in Cannes, France. The award celebrated the documentary's tribute to Minshall's global artistic influence, including his role in creating cultural icons such as the "tube man" that has appeared at major events worldwide.

Directed by Life Garland, the documentary explores Minshall's lasting impact on Carnival arts and performance culture, drawing international attention to the creative contributions of Trinidad and Tobago. The film's recognition came at an independent showcase supported by diversity-focused partners and provided an important platform for underrepresented voices in cinema.

Caribbean Day at Pavillon Afriques brought together filmmakers, producers and global industry professionals,

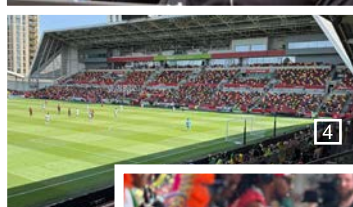
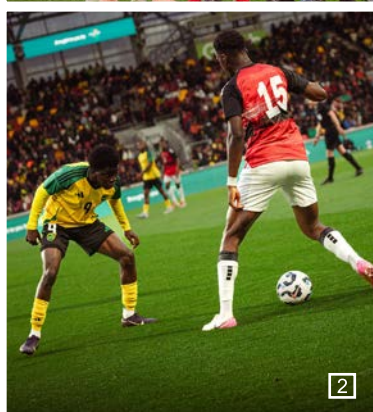

T&T SENIOR MEN'S FOOTBALL TEAM COMPETE AT UNITY CUP 2025 IN LONDON

Trinidad and Tobago's senior men's football team, the Soca Warriors, competed with determination at the 2025 Unity Cup, an Afro Caribbean invitational tournament hosted at Brentford FC's Gtech Community Stadium in West London. The competition marked the return of the Unity Cup after a 21 year hiatus and featured teams from Trinidad and Tobago, Jamaica, Ghana, and Nigeria, drawing large diasporic support.

The Warriors opened their campaign on 27 May against regional rivals Jamaica. After falling behind by two goals, Trinidad and Tobago mounted a spirited comeback, with Isaiah Leacock and Kevin Molino both scoring to level the match at 2–2. However, a late penalty conceded in added time allowed Jamaica to secure a 3–2 victory in a dramatic encounter that showcased the Warriors' resilience.

Trinidad and Tobago then faced Ghana in the third place playoff on 31 May. Despite moments

of promise, the Warriors were defeated 4–0, with the experience providing valuable lessons for a squad blending youth and seasoned players ahead of upcoming fixtures.

Head Coach Dwight Yorke described the Unity Cup as an important “eye opener” for his players, offering exposure to varied playing styles and competition levels not often encountered outside the CONCACAF region.

Adding to the excitement of the tournament, UK-based award winning soca artist Triniboi Joojie brought his signature energy to the Gtech Stadium, performing live for fans and adding a vibrant

cultural dimension to the matches. His appearance highlighted the strong connection between Trinidad and Tobago's sporting and musical talent, celebrating the nation's presence on the UK stage.

TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO FOOTBALLERS MAKE STRIDES IN EUROPE

Trinidad and Tobago continues to make its mark in international football with two players securing significant moves in Europe during the 2025 summer transfer window.



Kédie Johnson, a Women's International defender, became the seventh recruit of French Arkema Première Ligue club AS Saint-Étienne. Johnson, who first moved to Europe in 2023 with LOSC, featured in 25 matches over two seasons, gaining valuable top-flight experience. At Saint-Étienne, she will wear the number 20 shirt under coach Sébastien Joseph. "I am very proud to sign with this iconic club. It's not often that a Trinibagonian player has the chance to play at the highest level in France," Johnson said.

side St Johnstone. Raymond, made 21 appearances for St Johnstone and spent time on loan at Dunfermline Athletic before his move. Ilves sporting director Miika Takkula praised Raymond's pace, attacking runs, and crossing ability, noting that he brings "new options to the attacking third." Raymond, who debuted for T&T in 2023, recently featured in the Unity Cup, FIFA 2026 World Cup qualifiers, and Concacaf Gold Cup matches.

Both moves underscore the growing presence and impact of Trinidad and Tobago talent in Europe's competitive leagues, offering valuable international experience and exposure.

T&T STUDENT GAINS HANDS-ON EXPERIENCE IN SURGICAL ROBOTICS AT LEEDS



Mr. Justin Sooknanan of Trinidad and Tobago was among a select group of Caribbean students chosen to participate in the inaugural CariSurg Summer Surgical Robotics Research Programme at the University of Leeds. The eight-week initiative, hosted in the internationally recognised STORM Lab, provided Justin with the opportunity to engage directly in cutting-edge surgical robotics research, bridging engineering and medical sciences. Working alongside students from the University of the West Indies and Columbia University, Justin contributed to innovative projects including advancing

AI tools for the da Vinci surgical robot, designing magnetic vines for endoscopic procedures, and developing affordable cancer screening technology. The programme was supervised by Professor Pietro Valdastri (University of Leeds) and Dr. Carl Beckford (UWI), giving participants invaluable exposure to world-class research environments.

A major highlight for Justin was a visit to Guy's and St Thomas' NHS Foundation Trust in London, where the group observed a live robotic-assisted surgery performed by Barbadian urologist and UWI alumnus Dr. Jonathan Noël. The

students also presented their research progress and vision for improving Caribbean healthcare to His Excellency Anthony B. Severin OBE, High Commissioner of Saint Lucia.

Established by Dr. Nikita Greenidge, the CariSurg programme aims to create sustainable research pathways for Caribbean students. Justin's participation reflects the growing presence of Trinidad and Tobago talent in advanced global research spaces and underscores the country's potential contribution to medical innovation in the region.

Mouthwatering Recipes From Trinidad And Tobago

TRINIDAD BLACK CAKE

Preparation

Prep Time: 30 mins | Soaking Time: 1 week (soaking fruit in rum/brandied mixture) | Cook Time: 120-150 mins | Serves 12-16 (two 9-inch cakes)

Ingredients:

- 1¼ lb raisins
- ½ lb currants
- ¾ lb sultanas
- ½ lb prunes
- ½ lb chopped walnuts
- ¼ lb mixed peel
- ¼ lb cherries
- 1⅔ cups dark rum
- 1⅔ cups cherry brandy
- 1 lb butter
- 1 lb brown sugar
- 6 eggs
- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 3 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp cinnamon and allspice, mixed
- 2 tsp essence

Method:

1. Brandy or rum to 'nurse' your cake with after baking
2. Seed and cut up fruits, except cherries into about ¼-inch pieces.
3. Combine rum and cherry brandy and add fruits to mixture.

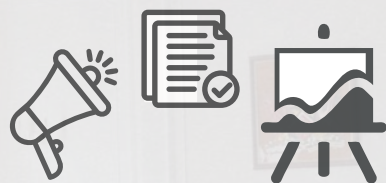
4. Let soak overnight or up to one week, longer if preferred.
5. Preheat oven to 300F.
6. Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy.
7. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition.
8. Black cake ingredients - Photo by Wendy Rahamut
9. Sift together flour and baking powder, cinnamon and allspice.
10. Drain fruits reserve liquid, mince fruits.
11. Add drained fruits to butter and sugar mixture.
12. Add cut up cherries and nuts.
13. Fold flour into fruits and butter mixture, alternately with
14. Remaining liquid.
15. Add mixed essence, mix well.
16. Grease and line two 9-inch cake pans with waxed paper, grease and flour paper
17. Spoon cake batter equally into prepared baking pans.
18. Bake for 2 to 2½ hours.
19. Pour on brandy or rum in tablespoon increments over cakes after baking.
20. Repeat this for about one week.

Your cake will keep well wrapped and in a covered tin for about one year.

***Note:** To make a non alcohol version of this cake soak your fruits in grape juice for just one week, refrigerated, this cake will need to be refrigerated a few days after baking.*
